SUNDAY, APRIL 30, 2023 – DAY 1

- 12:00 – 1:00 pm** **The Cat is Losing Hair: It's Not Allergies & It's Not Dermatophytes, Now What?**, *Dr. Catherine Outerbridge*
In this session, we will review how to determine if alopecia in a cat is due to self-trauma or dermatophytes. We will discuss skin diseases that present with the primary clinical sign of alopecia that is not caused by dermatophytes or self-trauma from allergic dermatitis. For the alopecic skin diseases discussed in this session, associated clinical clues will be highlighted, diagnostic approach reviewed, and any treatment options discussed.
- 1:15 – 2:30 pm** **Feline Regional Dermatoses: Skin Diseases that Target the Dorsal Muzzle, Footpads, or Sometimes Both**, *Dr. Catherine Outerbridge*
This lecture will review those diseases that can cause regional skin lesions in cats, looking at examples of diseases that preferentially cause skin lesions that involve the dorsal muzzle or footpads. With some diseases discussed in this lecture, such as pemphigus foliaceus, both anatomic locations can be affected. Clinical clues from the history, dermatologic exam findings, and diagnostic results will be shared for a number of varying diseases along with challenges the clinician can face when presented with cats with these regionalized lesions.
- 2:45 – 3:45 pm** **The Do's and Don't's of Trauma**, *Dr. Steven Berkowitz*
Common emergency room traumas and what to do to stabilize and appropriately manage trauma patients will be discussed. This lecture will include stabilization, appropriate pain management, "damage control," and appropriate fluids and antibiotics when indicated. We will also discuss common mistakes and pitfalls. Trauma scoring, prognostic indicators, and VetCOT information will also be discussed.
- 4:00 – 5:00 pm** **Feline Respiratory Emergencies: "Stat: Why is My Cat Panting?!"**, *Dr. Steven Berkowitz*
This lecture will consist of the rapid triage and management of feline respiratory emergencies. Anatomy and pathophysiology of the most common emergency presentations will be discussed in detail, as well as the emergent therapeutic and diagnostic options recommended. This lecture will be aimed for a general practice hospital, as well as an emergency facility.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 10, 2023 – DAY 2

- 2:00 – 3:00 pm** **A Bright Future for Painful Cats: New, Improved, & Emerging Options for Multimodal Management of Feline Osteoarthritis**, *Dr. Erin Dresner*
This session will address the many recent achievements in the diagnosis and management of feline osteoarthritis pain, including advanced assessment options, novel treatments, and bolstered evidence in support of integrative therapies. Tips for practical implementation of new, improved, and emerging management options will be provided along with case examples for the following therapeutic modalities: biological therapy (Solensia), novel nutraceuticals, veterinary medical acupuncture, shockwave therapy, laser therapy, targeted pulsed electromagnetic field therapy (tPEMF), and sound wave technology.
- 3:15 – 4:15 pm** **Feline Neurology: Pearls for Your Practice**, *Dr. Joane Parent*
With 40 years of experience in clinical neurology, I will discuss the doing and interpreting of specific tests of the neurological examination: mental status, menace responses, nasal septum stimulation, and proprioceptive positioning. This will be followed by a short review of the recent literature on intervertebral disc disease in cats, a problem considered rather infrequent in the past. If time allows, I will offer pointers and tips about feline epilepsy.
- 4:30 – 5:30 pm** **Improving Interpretation of Pulmonary Patterns**, *Dr. Lorrie Gaschen*
This session will review how to diagnose air space, air way (bronchocentric), interstitial, and complex pattern of the feline lung. A discussion of acquired allergic, infectious vs. neoplastic diseases will be demonstrated with case examples. Emphasis will be on how to create a plan of action based on the lung abnormalities and best arrive at a diagnosis using numerous case examples.
- 5:45 – 7:00 pm** **FIP Updates: Optimizing Treatment Now & Into the Future**, *Dr. Sally Jayne Coggins*
Feline Infectious Peritonitis (FIP) is now considered a treatable disease. In this rapidly evolving area of feline medicine, Australian vets were the first to gain legal access to new generation antiviral drugs including remdesivir, GS-441524 and molnupiravir. Attendees will receive updates on current options being utilized in Australia for successful antiviral treatment of FIP, key parameters for monitor during treatment, and how to troubleshoot apparent treatment failure now and into the future.

SATURDAY, MAY 20, 2023 – DAY 3

- 12:00 – 1:20 pm** **Management of Oral & Dental Pain**, *Dr. Heidi Lobprise*
Oral and dental diseases, as well as any surgical intervention, can cause discomfort and inflammation in the oral cavity. From periodontal disease and fractured teeth to tooth resorption and even chronic pain, resolution of these issues can improve the quality of life of our patients. Management of oral and dental disease, as well as a comprehensive, multi-modal analgesic protocol can keep our patients comfortable and return them to health and function through optimal healing.
- 1:15 – 2:30 pm** **Feline Stomatitis**, *Dr. Heidi Lobprise*
Cats display several unique conditions when it comes to the oral cavity, even though the basic concepts of periodontal disease apply. Stomatitis can be a frustrating syndrome, and while conservative and medical choices may help patients in the early stages of the disease, often caudal mouth extractions become necessary eventually.
- 2:45 – 3:45 pm** **Anterior Uveitis: Don't Miss The Big Stuff**, *Dr. Jessica Meekins*
Many practitioners feel a mild sense of panic when faced with the dreaded "Check Eye" complaint on the appointment schedule. In this session, we will focus on strengthening your ability to recognize clinical signs of intraocular disease (i.e., anterior uveitis) that result in the presenting complaint of a red, cloudy, squinty eye in our feline patients. We will discuss some specific systemic diseases that manifest within the eye, while also reviewing clinical manifestation(s), sequelae, and prognosis for the unique feline idiopathic uveitis syndrome, lymphocytic-plasmocytic uveitis.
- 4:00 – 5:00 pm** **The Crystalluria Dilemma: When Should I Care About Crystals?**, *Dr. Julie Byron*
Crystalluria is a common finding on feline urinalysis, and it may be tempting to reach for a therapeutic diet every time that crystals are seen, but not every crystalluria case actually requires treatment. In this session, we will discuss common presentations of crystalluria and how to interpret crystalluria in the context of overall urinalysis findings, sample handling, clinical signs, and prior medical history. For those cases that do warrant treatment, treatment strategies will be discussed including nutrition, supplements, and pharmaceuticals, as well as recommended monitoring strategies.

Steve Berkowitz, DVM, DACVECC

NorthStar VETS Veterinary Emergency, Trauma, and Specialty Centers, Hamilton, NJ

Dr. Steve Berkowitz attended St. Georges University and did his clinical year at University of Illinois. Dr. Berkowitz joined NorthStar VETS after service as the Chief of Emergency and Critical Care at another hospital. Prior to that, he completed a three-year residency in Emergency and Critical Care at Oradell Animal Hospital in Paramus, NJ. His residency was completed at one of the first level one veterinary trauma centers in the US. Dr. Berkowitz can be seen on seasons 5 and 6 of “Animal Precinct” on Animal Planet, which was filmed where he did his internship. Dr. Berkowitz’s professional interests include management of metabolic and endocrine emergencies, as well as septic patients. He is published as the primary author in the Journal of Veterinary Emergency and Critical Care for “Resolution of spontaneous hemiabdomen secondary to peliosis hepatis following surgery and azithromycin treatment in a Bartonella species infected dog.” Dr. Berkowitz serves on the Board of Trustees for “Mickey’s Kids,” which provides service dogs for children in need. He is also on the Board of Diversity and Inclusion within ACVECC. He is currently involved in the reviewing process for the newest version of the RECOVER Guidelines, advancing knowledge in CPR in the veterinary field. Dr Berkowitz is the staff Criticalist and Director of the Ann Smith Memorial Blood Bank at NorthStar VETS.

Sally has now turned her attention to research, commencing a full-time PhD under the supervision of Professor Jacqueline Norris, Associate Professor Merran Govendir, and Associate Professor Mary Thompson at the Sydney School of Veterinary Science, The University of Sydney since late 2020. Sally is currently investigating novel antiviral therapeutics for Feline Infectious Peritonitis and has conducted a national prospective study assessing the FIP treatment utility of parenteral remdesivir and oral GS-441524. She continues to practice as a feline-only clinician at EverVet in Melbourne, as well being a feline medicine distance education course tutor for the Centre for Veterinary Education, The University of Sydney.

Lorrie is now working as an Adjunct professor at the LSU School of veterinary medicine and in teleradiology with VetCT and enjoys reporting on all species and all modalities with a special interest in exotic imaging.

Dr. Catherine Outerbridge is currently a Professor of Clinical Dermatology at the University of California Davis and the Vice-Chair of the Department of Veterinary Medicine and Epidemiology. She is a graduate of the Ontario Veterinary College (OVC) at the University of Guelph in Ontario, Canada. She completed her Masters of Veterinary Science and a residency in small animal internal medicine at the Western College of Veterinary Medicine (WCVI) at the University of Saskatchewan and then her residency in dermatology at the University of California, Davis. She is a Diplomate of ACVIM in small animal internal medicine and a Diplomate of the ACVD. Dr. Outerbridge has served as the President of the American Academy of Veterinary Dermatology, Secretary of the World Association for Veterinary Dermatology, and is serving a second term as the ACVD representative to the WAVD. She is currently the President of WCVD10 which will take place in Boston in July 2024. Her clinical areas of interest include all aspects of clinical dermatology but she has a particular interest in cutaneous manifestations of systemic disease, metabolic skin diseases, infectious skin disease and antimicrobial resistance, and feline genodermatoses.

Dr. Joane Parent obtained her DMV degree from the Faculté de Médecine Vétérinaire of the Université de Montréal in 1975, completed an internship and residency in Internal Medicine at the Western College of Veterinary Medicine (WCVI), University of Saskatchewan (1975-1978) with a Master in Veterinary Sciences, followed by a neurology residency at the University of California at Davis and the New York State College of Veterinary Medicine from 1978 to 1980. She is a Diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Internal Medicine, specialty of neurology since 1983. She was President of the ACVIM Neurology group from 2002-2005. FAQs

Do I have to be present on all days of the meeting to attend?
